**Jim's Corner** February 2024

ebruary 14<sup>th</sup> is Valentine's Day, as well as Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent this year. For this article, I want to focus on Valentine's Day as the one day of the year when those in love go out of their way to show that love to each other. We've grown up thinking of Valentine's Day as a day for sweethearts to exchange tender expressions of affection symbolized by cards, chocolates, and going out for dinner. It is a romantic sentiment that makes the card companies and restaurants a lot of money.

Love is an important emotion in our lives. Countless songs are devoted to the subject. The same could be said for the number of romances, poems, dramas, fairy tales, and other literary genre devoted to the subject. It has been said that "Love makes the world go 'round." I would venture to say that virtually everyone thinks about love every day at

one time or another.

I suggest that the greatest love letter ever written is the Bible. This is God's love letter to all of us. From Genesis to The Revelation to John, God reveals his love for us in narrative story, psalms, poetry, and prophecy. For instance, "The Song of Solomon is a collection of about twenty-five lyric poems or fragments of poems of human love and courtship such as would be sung appropriately at weddings (Jer.33.11)."<sup>1</sup> Sometimes this love seems to be missing when we read of God's judgment of human behavior, but judgment itself is an expression of love. This is what we often refer to as "tough love." If God did not love humankind, he wouldn't correct us and put us back on the proper path.

John the evangelist speaks of love often. John 3:16 is, perhaps, one of the most quoted passages in which John tells us, "For God so loved the

world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." The following verse tells us why the Father did that. "For God sent the Son into the world, not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him." Author Philip Yancy relates the story of Jesus' encounter with a Samaritan woman. He goes on to say, "Knowing well the antipathy between the two groups, she marveled that a Jewish rabbi would even speak to her. At one point she brought up one of the disputed points of doctrine: Who had the proper place of worship, the Jews or the Samaritans? Jesus deftly sidestepped the question and bore in on a far more important issue: her unquenched thirst. He offered her not judgment but a lasting solution to her guilt over an unsettled life. To her and her alone he openly identified himself as Messiah and chose her as a grace [love] dispenser. Her transformation captured the attention of the whole town, and Jesus stayed for two days among the 'heretics,' attracting many converts."<sup>2</sup> In John 15:13 we learn, "Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." This verse reinforces what was said in John 3:16 because this is exactly what Jesus did for all humans, and creation, when he was lifted on a cross to die for our sins. In his epistles, John talks about love and how we show God's love to the world. We love God because he loved us first (1 John 4:19). He showed us his love for us by dying and raising us to everlasting life by his resurrection. There is no greater gift than that! How could we not love him in return?

The parables are often stories of love. The Prodigal Son is an example of God's love for us. We go astray, but God opens his arms and welcomes us home when we come to our senses (Luke 15:11-32). The Parable of the Good Samaritan reveals how God's love for us is shown in the loving care the Samaritan gave to the man who was beaten and robbed on his way from Jerusalem to Jericho (Luke 10:30-37). The story of Zacchaeus, a hated tax collector, reveals God's love for the outcast (Luke 19:1-10).

Later, St. Paul would write a whole chapter on love as the greatest Christian virtue. "If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give away all I have, and if I deliver my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing.... So faith, hope, love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love" (1 Corinthians 13:1-3, 13 RSV).

These are only a few examples of how love is shown in the Bible. During this Lenten period, whenever you pick up your Bible, consider reading the passages, Old Testament and New Testament, through the lens of love. I suggest that would be a great Lenten discipline.

Fr. Jim will lead the five-week Lenten program using Philip Yancey's book and DVD study of *Vanishing Grace*. Quoting from the information on the back of his book:

Countering the Bad News about the Good News



"Why does the church stir up such negative feelings?"

Philip Yancey has been asking this question all his life, a question more relevant now than ever. Research shows that in a twenty-year span starting in the mid-nineties, favorable opinions of Christians have plummeted drastically. And opinions of evangelicals have taken even deeper dives.

Yet despite the turn away from Christianity, interest in spirituality is rising. Why the disconnect? Why are so many questioning, "What's so good about the Good News?"

Even more important, how can Christians make a positive, grace-filled difference in a world of desperate need?

In this important book, ... Philip Yancey explores what may have contributed to hostility toward Christians. He then offers illuminating stories of how artists, activists, and pilgrims are expressing their faith in ways that disarm even the most cynical critics.

"See to it that no one misses the grace of God," writes the author of Hebrews. In this book, Yancey paints a poignant picture of what the world would look like if Christians fulfilled this command as a way of life.

We will meet in the Parish Hall, Wednesday evenings from 7 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. at the latest (we may be finished by 8, depending on the size of the group and the discussion), on February 21, 28, and March 6, 13, and 20. The book and Study Guide can be found at Christianbook.com and Amazon. The study will begin with a DVD presentation by Philip Yancey, and this will be followed by discussion based on the Study Guide. ### <u>A word from St. Peter's Search Commíttee</u>

#### The search for a new pastor

St. Peter's Search Committee has met four times thus far, one of those being with Canon Roy Hoffman from the Diocese of Southern Virginia. We continue to formulate the documentation required to present to the Vestry, and then to the Diocese for position advertisement on their network.

Our initial goal is to prepare answers to the Office of Transition Ministry (OTM) Community Portfolio Worksheet, which contains details regarding St. Peter's. This will include points of contact at the church, service attendance numbers, financial information, Day School data, and a series of pages with different types of questions regarding who we are as a parish, interview questions for candidates, and answers to questions we feel a prospective clergy might ask us in return during the interview.

Once submitted to the Vestry, the information gathered by Canon Lynn Farlin through our previous Transition Team formation events will be incorporated into our profile.

Again, this will then be advertised by the Diocese, as well as the finished profile posted on our website for the person God has determined will serve as St. Peter's next pastor.

We will continue to advise the parish as things progress through the search and interview processes.

#### **Vestry Meeting Minutes**

#### December 11, 2023 - Approved January 8, 2024

**Opening:** The St. Peter's Vestry met together in the Diffenbaugh Library and via Zoom on December 11, 2023. Attending the meeting in person were Fr. Jim Hunter, Kimberly Truxell, Vel Shreve, Linsey Shreve, Judy Eller, and Debbie Whitehorne. Attending the Zoom were Liz Kress, Charlie Pfeifer, and Peggy Pfeifer. This meeting began with Evening Prayer at 7:00 P.M.

<u>Agenda</u>: Fr. Jim asked all to look at the agenda for the evening and see if any changes or additions needed to be made before starting. The date was changed to reflect December 11 instead of December 13. Charlie suggested that the Ministry Action Plan (MAP/Budget) be included. Laura asked that "Sunday closing of the church" be added – for clarification, what needs to be secured/shut off or closed after every Sunday service as some things are missed. Judy motioned to accept the agenda with changes, Vel seconded. Passed by acclamation.

**November 2023 Minutes:** The minutes were read and a motion to accept the minutes was made by Judy Eller and seconded by Debbie Whitehorne. The minutes were accepted as written, by acclamation.

**<u>Rector's Report:</u>** Nothing currently.

<u>Senior Warden's Report</u>: Her work here as Senior Warden is ending, and she is looking forward to her new position on the Cursillo Secretariat.

Junior Warden: Not in attendance.

#### New Business:

- 1. <u>Housing Allowance Resolution</u> The housing allowance for Fr. Jim must be approved yearly by the Vestry and noted in the minutes by Laura Kallestad. The notice states as follows:
- "Whereas the Rev. Dr. James W. Hunter is employed as Interim Rector by St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Norfolk, Virginia, which does not provide a residence for him,
- **Be it resolved** that of the total compensation of \$20,165 to be paid to the Rev. Dr. James W. Hunter during 2024, that \$20,165 be designated as Housing Allowance within the meaning of that term as used in Section 107 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986."
- Kimberly Truxell made the motion to accept the Housing Allowance Resolution as written and Vel seconded the motion. It was approved by acclamation.

- 2. <u>Diocesan Pledge</u> Charlie suggested that the amount given this year should not change from last year. This suggestion was approved by the Vestry.
- 3. <u>Annual Meeting</u> Is set for January 7, 2024, after the 10:00 A.M. service. The only reports missing currently are the Senior Warden report, the Day School report, and the Year-End Financials (which are not available until the end of December).
- 4. <u>Vestry Election</u> Vel Shreve and Charlotte Corbett are the only nominations received at this time. Several members of the church were approached, and all declined. Fr. Jim would like at least one additional nomination.
- 5. <u>Ministry Action Plan</u> Charlie presented a draft for the proposed budget for 2024.

November Financial Report: Kimberly reported on the November Financials with Charlie in Zoom.

The Cash Account Balances for November 2023 are as follows:

Operating Account:	\$40,444.26
Money Market Account	\$40,076.06
Composite Fund:	\$71,104.39
Total Net Assets:	\$154,790.04

Vel motioned to accept the November Financial Report and Linsey seconded. It was approved by acclamation.

6. <u>Closing and locking up the church after services</u>: The spotlights on the Last Supper (Stained Glass) were left on and the door from the church to the Parish Hall was left open and unsecured. Other doors and locks have been left open in the past. The check list for the counters needs to be updated and available every Sunday to make sure everything is secure. Laura will update a checklist for the counters or whoever is assigned to this task.

#### <u>Old Business</u> –

- 1. <u>Parish Pledge Drive</u> Pledged Income \$129,558.00 29 Pledges received. 18 pledges were increased. 1 pledge was decreased. 3 new pledges were received. 5 pledges that have not yet been received (for an approximate value of \$13,400). The average pledge for 2023 is over \$4400 and the average pledge for 2024 is over \$4900.
- 2. <u>Electrical Problems in Day School and Church</u> Debbie is going to obtain quotes on our deteriorating wiring issues.

- 3. <u>Lay Eucharistic Visitor Training</u> Lay Eucharistic Minister, Worship Leader, and Lay Eucharistic Visitor Training is currently being offered at Grace Church in Norfolk on January 13<sup>th</sup>. Jim would like Bruce, Nancy, and Charlie to attend this training. Charlie and Nancy cannot attend, and they will have to receive this training before the form for licensing is submitted to the Diocese.
- 4. <u>Interim Ministry</u> No update currently.
- 5. <u>Bylaws</u> Charlie stated that he has about 2 hours of work left and they will be completed.
- 6. <u>Day School Director</u> when Fr. Jim leaves, Laura will be the "Director" of the Day School until a replacement priest is hired.

The next Vestry meeting will be January 8, 2024.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed with the remainder of the Evening Prayer service and then adjourned.
