How is it that you say, 'You will be made free?' Jesus answered them, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not continue in the house for ever; the son continues for ever. So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed." (John 8:31-36, RSV). We find true freedom in Christ. The "truth" Jesus is speaking about is not knowledge in general, but saving truth. To be truly free is to be free from sin and its slavery. This is what Jesus achieved by dying on a cross. He defeated the power of sin by not succumbing to the temptation to disobey God the Father's will. He killed death by being raised from the dead by God the Father, never to die again. This is the true freedom Jesus offers all who believe, trust, in him. When we find true freedom in Christ, we become united in the love of Christ. We are one in Christ. Anything that is done to divide us, is not Christian. Paul said, "For by grace you have been saved by faith; and this is not your own doing, it is the gift of God – not because of works, lest any man should boast." (Ephesians 2:8-9, RSV). This salvation is truly free because we do not deserve it, we did not earn it, and, once we have it, no one can take it away from us. "For I am sure that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation (emphasis added), will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38-39, RSV). This freedom and unity we celebrate and remember every time we receive the Holy Eucharist.

So, let's joyfully celebrate our freedoms under the Constitution of the United States of America this Fourth of July. Remember that we stand on the shoulders of those brave men and women who gave us this nation and fought for our liberty. Letter from the Transition Team:

Every living being in God's creation experiences transition on a consistent and continual basis. We human beings are not exempt from the joys and struggles of transition. Our lives are filled with transitions big and small, be it the commute from home to work, a move to a new town, the day we embrace a new job, or the moment we bid farewell to a beloved friend. God is in the midst of all of our transitions, leading us from the wilderness of hope to the joy of the Promised Land. In the midst of our transitions God provides us "food enough," giving us everything we need and then some. Church Communities are not by any means exempt from transition. Congregations are continually transitioning from Sunday to Sunday and from Season to Season. Our congregation is now in the midst of a significant transition as we begin the process that leads to the call of a new rector. Please remember that God is in the midst of our congregation as we enter this transition, providing us "food enough" and everything we need to faithfully enter this process. Our Diocesan Bishop is with us on this journey, providing us the support, encouragement and guidance we need at this time. The Diocesan Transition Minister (consultant) serves as the Bishop's liaison to our congregation and pledges to provide us the consultation and resources needed to transition successfully into the next stage of our congregation's life. Two-way communication between the congregation, clergy, and the Bishop's Office is an essential ingredient of a successful search. We are in the process of developing our document which is intended as a roadmap of this transition process. It is not, nor should it be used as, a step-by-step guide. Each congregational situation is unique and should be treated as such. There is always a measure of uncertainty when a congregation is in transition. However, be assured, this is a time of great grace and promise. Parish communities often discover in transition that they have a capacity for faithfulness, creativity, humor, and spiritual maturity that they did not know before. The Transition team's hope and prayer is that you will discover new joys and opportunities to be light and salt for the world as we embark on this journey. Please continue to pray for our team and congregation as we move forward in this process. There will be more information being shared in the coming weeks as we develop our transition document.



Hoovey July 5 Film length: 1 hour; 31 minutes

Hoovey is based on the true story of Eric "Hoovey" Elliott (Cody Linley), a high school basketball player in rural Northern Illinois. He comes from a wholesome, athletic family: high school sweetheart parents Jeff (Patrick Warburton) and Ruth (Lauren Holly), and talented older sister, Jen (Alyson Stoner). Then one day during basketball practice, Hoovey collapses and blacks out; his firefighter dad assumes that he's suffered a concussion and rushes him to the hospital. But it turns out Hoovey has a large tumor on the base of his brain. Hoovey requires a life-threatening surgery that could limit his ability to walk and talk, much less play basketball. The Elliotts pray and remain faithful,

even as Hoovey's chronic condition threatens not just his life but the family's stability.

Film length: 1 hour; 30 minutes

Nikki Cominsky is a lawyer with problems in her married life. She moved from Cincinnati, Ohio and is working for a large law firm in the Chicago area. She invites her husband to have a romantic dinner at a local restaurant, but he has already made plans to go to a baseball game. Disappointed, she goes to work and sees an invitation for dinner at the very same restaurant that she was planning on going to with her husband. At first she is irked because she is sick of the local churches' attempts at getting new followers, but quickly realizes that this may be a romantic attempt from her husband. Excited, she goes to the

restaurant, but sees a mysterious man claiming to be Jesus Christ. She thinks the man is crazy and attempts to leave, but the man persuades her to stay by telling her that after dinner he would tell her who sent him. Knowing that she would want to find out who is responsible, and not wanting to refuse a free dinner, she stays. The man begins to use real life examples such as family and other religions to tie in why Christianity is the one true religion, also as to why he really is, in fact, Jesus. Throughout their evening of conversation, arguments and debate, Nikki learns things she never knew about life, Heaven, Hell, other religions, the universe, and even herself.

Vestry Meeting Minutes

May 8, 2023

Opening: The St. Peter's Vestry met together in the Diffenbaugh Library on May 8, 2023. Attending the meeting were Fr. Jim, Kimberly Truxell, Debbie Whitehorne, Bruce Comfort, Howard Belote, Judy Eller, Linsey Shreve, Vel Shreve, Charlie Pfeifer, Peggy Pfeifer, and Liz Kress.

<u>Vestry Meeting Opening</u>: The Vestry Meeting was opened with the beginning of the service of Evening Prayer led by Debbie Whitehorne.

Agenda: Fr. Jim asked all to look at the agenda for the evening and see if any changes or additions needed to be made before starting. In New Business, cleaning service information was added as a discussion point and Kimberly motioned to accept the agenda, and it was seconded. The agenda was accepted by acclamation.

<u>March 2023 Minutes</u>: April 2023 Minutes were distributed to the vestry. Charlie motioned to accept the minutes, Vel seconded. The minutes were approved by acclimation.

Finance Report: Charlie reviewed the April Financial Report with the vestry.

Bruce motioned to accept the Financial Report, Debbie seconded, and it was approved by acclamation.

<u>Rector's Report:</u> Fr. Jim reported that he was pleased to be able to take communion to Mary and Larry Laine.

Senior Warden's Report: Kimberly had nothing to report at this time.

Junior Warden: Bruce had nothing to report at this time.

New Business:

- Fr. Jim asked the Vestry to decide on a new date for the June Meeting the 12th (2nd Monday) is when the Day School will have their program which makes that date impossible. He proposed the 5th as a new date. All agreed on that date for the June meeting.
- We received a thank-you note from the VA for articles donated to them. Bob Vanderslice will take over that outreach from Bill Weisner.
- The Commissioning of the Transition Team was Sunday past, May 7th, and all went well, and it is a progression to finding a new Rector. They will begin meeting shortly.
- Debbie gave a report about the Cleaning Guyz cleaning service we currently employ. There have been issues and a trail cam was set up to surveil the door to the attic. It was observed that unacceptable things were happening including possible theft of supplies and strangers onsite. The company was informed in a meeting with our contact, Christian, and he guaranteed to resolve the matter, remove the staff member, and find us another person that he felt he could trust. Laura mentioned that the Day School was much cleaner and the smell fresher this past Sunday when she went in. It is assumed that Christian did the cleaning this time.
- Debbie has two other quotes, and both are more expensive. Before we switch, we will be giving Christian's crew another chance to show they are worth keeping onboard.

Old Business:

- Fr. Jim handed out an Organizational Chart for the vestry members to look over and offer suggestions, improvements, etc. The chart shows all the Vestry members and an association with various ministries for which they would be a liaison. This is an Organizational Chart that is being built gradually and with suggestions from the members about where they feel called. It will function as an oversite of ministries so that the members have a person to contact should they need something from the Vestry. Modifications to this chart were made to everyone's satisfaction.
- Howard Belote announced that this would be his last meeting. He just didn't have the initiative nor the desire to continue. The other members of the Vestry agreed that if that was what he thought was best then they would stand by his request to be removed.
- Playground wood for the border has been delivered and half of the border has been installed by Matt McGary and Charet Thill. The delivery was delayed and missed the weekend when he was available full time, so he has been coming in and working on it as able. After the border has been installed, then the mulch can be put down. Bruce did note that the mulch would be expensive but needs to be done.
- Review of the Annual Audit of the Church books needs to be accomplished by September 1st, 2023. As per Charlie, Carolyn King will be doing this audit these weeks she is here to sell her property.
- Bruce advised the Vestry that a security system should be installed throughout the building and monitored John's Brothers Security or Maury Kroll Lock and Key should be able to provide the answers and recommendations for equipment. The only door that is "Fire Marshall approved" is the red door as it has a handle that opens regardless of whether it is locked or not. Crash bars need/should be installed on all other doors. In case of an emergency, those inside the building can exit even if the door is locked. He will contact John's Brothers to assess the cost of installing a system and monitoring.
- The parish hall steeple work has been completed, and the place where the worker fell through the ceiling has been repaired as best it can be.
- The Trustees for the church still need to be revised. Kimberly will contact the Diocese legal department to check if 4 people are allowed and exactly what needs to be filed.
- Fr. Jim was in contact with the Diocese, and St. Peter's is on the Bishop's list for visitation. We will be informed in the fall, when she will be here.
- The Vestry inquired about the Lenten offering that was earmarked for The Holy Trinity Cathedral in Trinidad and Tobago of which Shelly-Ann Tenia is the Dean. The approximate amount donated to date is \$1600.00. This amount is not the final amount. This Sunday, May 14th will be the final Sunday for donations and when the tally is complete, we will supplement to make the amount approximately \$2,000.00.

The next Vestry meeting will be June 5, 2023.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned and closed with the Lord's Prayer and the conclusion of the Evening Prayer at 8:27 P.M.


