# Jim's Corner

e often refer to St. Peter's as "our church family" in

conversation and as we think about our parish. The church family is much like our nuclear family. We live together, we have close relationships with each other, we eat meals together, we play together, and, yes, sometimes we have conflict and fight with each other. We can all relate to family dynamics, but we may not be aware of how these dynamics interrelate. Family Systems Theory helps us understand these dynamics and, thereby, understand how the family "works."

What I am about to share with you is a very general, but helpful, overview of Family Systems Theory. My hope and intention are that this will help all of us appreciate how we relate to each other and further our understanding of the work of the Transition Team as we look to the future with a new pastor. One of the "Fathers" of Family Systems Theory is Rabbi Freedman, who wrote a book titled *Generation to Generation*<sup>1</sup>.

One of the principal concepts of general family systems theory is the distinction between a mechanistic and an organic worldview. "Machines can be understood by breaking them down into their component parts to see how the parts work together

how the parts work together.... If one assumes that life is made up of component parts that can be named, understood and, most importantly, controlled, then it follows that what is needed is a quick fix. With machines, we repair what is broken and move on. Change is easily made. Social systems, like a family, are not machines but people.... Systems understand that change is constant. They are designed to change and then return to equilibrium. It's important to understand that what systems require is nourishing and nurturing, not fixing"<sup>2</sup> (emphasis added). The congregation/ family is an organic organism, not a machine.

"Systems theory implies that leadership is not about

knowing where the congregation is supposed to end up and controlling the interim time period to be sure it gets there. It is more about leaders nurturing the needs of the congregation and helping to provide new insights to aid them in managing their own time of change. All systems seek balance. Often, leaders see this effort to regain equilibrium as resistance to change. Push a system towards change and it is natural that it will push back. It wants to preserve its history and tradition. The first response to perceived instability is to seek a new stability." <sup>3</sup> Think of a perfectly balanced mobile. Touch one part of the mobile and the whole structure is set off balance. Left alone, in time, the mobile will seek out and resume its original attitude. Family systems function much the same way.

Another pioneer in family systems theory is Murray Bowen. There are three key concepts of Bowen Family Systems Theory I want to mention. The first is understanding Triangles and the phenomena of triangulation. "A triangle is a three-person relationship system.... People's actions in a triangle reflect their efforts to assure their emotional attachments to important others, their reactions to too much intensity in the attachments and their taking sides in other's conflicts.... The patterns in a triangle change with increasing tension."<sup>4</sup> Triangles may consist of three individuals or an institution (the church, diocese, a school board, social club, etc.) and two individuals. Triangulation often works like this. Person A has a beef with person B. Instead of working out their differences, person A approaches person C to share the grievance. Person C reacts by approaching person B to fix the problem. Person C becomes the victim of person B's displeasure. Triangles are often destructive and should be avoided. The way to break apart the triangle is for person C to, lovingly, direct person B back to person A and not get involved. Triangles happen all the time and, sometimes, they are unavoidable. They are not always destructive, but more often than not, they are.

The second key concept is Self-differentiation. "The less developed a person's 'self,' the more impact others have on his functioning and the more he tries to control, actively or passively, the functioning of others<sup>5</sup>. People with poorly differentiated 'self' depend so heavily on the acceptance and approval of others that either they quickly adjust what they think, say and do to please others or they dogmatically proclaim what others should be like and pressure them to conform." Clear self-differentiation is the ability to state one's position, using an "I" statement, and calmly defend it if one does not agree with an opposing position.

The third concept is known as Emotional Cutoff. "This concept…describes people managing their unresolved emotional issues … by reducing or totally cutting off emotional contact with others."<sup>6</sup> In this instance, discussion or negotiation has failed and the parties separate failing to resolve the conflict or issue. This can happen in churches when one person or group feels threatened or slighted and, not able to resolve the conflict, walks away from the church. In such cases, everyone loses. We need to be able to stay connected, communicate, and compromise for the good of the community. This is usually achievable.

These are three of the eight concepts of Bowen Family Systems Theory. The others, though important, aren't as germane to the church family. To answer any question one might have, however, the other five concepts are the Nuclear Family Emotional System, the Family Projection Process, the Multigenerational Transmission Process, Sibling Position, and the Societal Emotional Process.

Obviously, there is a lot more to family systems theory. If you would like to learn more about this subject, I recommend reading Friedman's and Kerr's books or GOOGLE Bowen family systems theory. Once one is aware of these theories, one can be a better participant in discussions involving family and church dynamics.





### St. Peter's Episcopal Church Vestry Meeting Minutes April 10, 2023

**Opening:** The St. Peter's Vestry met together in the Diffenbaugh Library on April 10, 2023. Attending the meeting were Fr. Jim, Kimberly Truxell, Debbie Whitehorne, Bruce Comfort, Howard Belote, Judy Eller, Linsey Shreve, Vel Shreve. Charlie Pfeifer and Liz Kress were absent.

<u>Vestry Meeting Opening</u>: The Vestry Meeting was opened with the beginning of the service of Evening Prayer led by Judy Eller.

<u>Agenda</u>: Fr. Jim asked all to look at the agenda for the evening and see if any changes or additions needed to be made before starting. In New Business, By-Laws were added as a discussion point and Security was added to the discussion in Old Business. Howard motioned to accept the agenda, and it was seconded by Kimberly. The agenda was accepted by acclamation.

<u>March 2023 Minutes</u>: March 2023 Minutes were distributed to the vestry. Bruce motioned to accept the minutes with minor modifications, Vel seconded. The minutes were approved with revisions.

**Finance Report:** Kimberly reviewed the March Financial Report with the vestry.

The Cash Account Balances for March 2023 are as follows:

Composite Fund:	\$66,275.01
Total Net Assets:	\$130,616.87

The March 2023 Financial Report was approved, and it was passed by acclamation.

**<u>Rector's Report:</u>** Fr. Jim reported that he was pleased to be able to take communion to Christine Alexander, visit with Mary and Larry Laine, visit with John Eidam following his surgery, and visit with Debbie Whitehorne following her surgery. He also attended a ZOOM meeting with the Interim Ministry Training group.

Senior Warden's Report: Kimberly had nothing to report at this time.

Junior Warden: Bruce had nothing to report at this time.

#### New Business:

- 1. Fr. Jim explained the Interim Ministry/Client Agreement "Listening to God: Discerning a Life-Giving Vision/Purpose Leading to Mission". Vestry is the "Client". Fr. Jim is the "student". The subject is St. Peter's "Vision" for its future. The commissioning of the Transition Team will occur as soon as Bruce finds out when all members are available.
- 2. Going back to the Common Cup. The Worship Committee voted to resume using the common cup at communion. Only 1 person dissented. The Bishop is in favor of the common cup. This would not allow for intinction by communicants. There are several options for intinction, and this information was discussed and will be reviewed later. Fr. Jim will make a series of announcements to the congregation through email, announcements time at church, and in his letter in *The Call*.

This will also include the information that simply receiving the bread is a valid communion. Kimberly suggested that we return to the common cup at Pentecost, and all agreed. Kimberly motioned that we return to the common cup and Linsey seconded. Passed by acclamation.

- 3. Fr. Jim will call the Diocesan office and ask to schedule a visit by the Bishop, The Right Rev. Susan Haynes.
- 4. Kimberly announced that Charlie believed that at least \$1,500.00 should be sent to the Dean Shelly-Ann at the Holy Cathedral of Trinidad and Tobago for their building/restoration fund. We have already collected close to that already and it shouldn't be a very large gap to make it an even \$1,500.00. All agreed this should be done.
- 5. The subject of bringing "goodies" to the breakfast coffee hour between services was addressed by Kimberly. Fr. Jim suggested that we start a Hospitality Committee or Ministry. The Committee/Ministry would monitor the goods that are brought to the church so that everyone gets a chance to contribute and limit the amount so that we do not have so much left over. Kimberly suggested that Jeannine might want to take this on as she started it for us. Announcements will be placed in the bulletins to get more members involved.
- 6. Charlie has volunteered to investigate the By-Laws for the church. Kimberly will help as soon as tax season is over. They will report monthly to the Vestry how it is going.

## Old Business:

- 1. Playground wood for the border has been delivered and is now waiting on Matt McGary to install. The delivery was delayed and missed the weekend when he was available. After the border has been installed, then the mulch can be put down.
- 2. Review of the Annual Audit of the Church books needs to be accomplished by September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023. This will be addressed when Charlie is able to attend a meeting, but Kimberly believed that Carolyn King would be doing this audit too.
- 3. Security lock on the office door is on hold until a sufficient door closer is installed. Bruce has ordered one and it should be arriving soon, and he will install it. However, he also feels strongly that a security system should be installed throughout the building and monitored John's Brothers Security or Maury Kroll Lock and Key should be able to provide the answers and recommendations for equipment.
- 4. The parish hall steeple work will shortly begin. The windows have arrived; they are just waiting for the weather to agree.
- 5. The Trustees for the church need to be revised. Howard has stated that he does not want to be a trustee anymore. Joe Sanderlin has passed away which leaves only Charlie Pfeifer. This is not adequate; Kimberly has talked to Charlie Pfeifer and Bruce Comfort, and they have agreed to be assigned as Trustees of the church. Fr. Jim then nominated Linsey Shreve to be a Trustee. Laura Kallestad suggested that Kimberly also be a Trustee to cover all generations. Kimberly will contact the Diocese legal department to check if 4 people are allowed and exactly what needs to be filed.
- 6. Security in the church is always a concern and especially on Sunday and during the week when Laura Kallestad is here alone. It was suggested that during worship services, the Ushers should be responsible for locking the red door, the office door, and the parish hall door. This information and all suggestions also fall under what Bruce Comfort pointed out, in #3 above, with a monitored security system.

The next Vestry meeting will be May 8, 2023.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned and closed with the Lord's Prayer and the conclusion of the Evening Prayer.
