

Jim's Corner

ow often have we heard it said, since COVID-19 broke out in March of 2020, "I can't wait until things can come back to normal, the way they used to be!"! For the Church, the first step in returning to "normal" was to return to in-person worship. Then we were allowed to leave our masks at home and sit closer in the pew. On March 10, 2022, Bishop Haynes issued a directive that removed the prohibition of distributing the wine at communion using the common chalice. Her directive followed guidance by the Health Advisory Panel of the Center for Disease Control (CDC). St. Peter's has slowly moved in this direction out of a pastoral concern for our congregation. Recently more and more parishioners have asked if we could adopt the diocesan policy of using the common cup. This organic desire to return to using the common chalice is another pastoral issue.

At the April vestry meeting the decision was made, with the advice of the Worship Committee, to start using the common cup on Pentecost Sunday, May 28, 2023. This decision was made after careful consideration and much prayer. We know that not everyone will agree with this decision, and we respect opposing views. Let me explain what the policy is and some theology behind it.

To begin with, it's important to know that, although most of us were raised under the impression that to have a full communion one needed to receive both the bread and the wine, this is a common misunderstanding. At the Last Supper, Jesus did institute the sacrament using both kinds, but the Church has long understood that Jesus is not evenly divided, 50-50%, into the bread and wine. Jesus is fully spiritually present, 100-100%, in both the bread and the wine,

so to receive just the bread or just the wine is to receive a full and valid communion. Many folks cannot drink alcohol for medical and health reasons. Others cannot tolerate gluten, a protein found in wheat flower which gives cohesiveness to dough. Until recently, there was no option, such as gluten-free bread, to offer communicants. So, receiving the bread or the wine alone is one option for receiving communion.

The common cup was universally, though not exclusively, used before COVID-19 hit. The policy of the Diocese of Southern Virginia is to return to using the common cup. One may sip from the chalice after consuming the host bread. This is the second option for receiving communion.

The third option involves the practice of intinction, the dipping of the host bread into the wine. Quoting Bishop Haynes, "The practice of dipping the consecrated bread in the consecrated wine has centuries of precedent. The Episcopal Church has generally held to the essential importance of the common cup to the fullness of eucharistic theology. The Book of Common Prayer allows for reception "in both kinds simultaneously, in a manner approved by the bishop" (BCP p. 408), but the rubrics clearly prefer reception in both kinds separately. Moreover, research has consistently affirmed that the risk of disease transmission through the common chalice is very low. Intinction, rather than diminishing the risk, actually raises the risk because the hands often carry and transmit germs. Sipping from the common chalice is safer. If offering intinction, a separate station should be set up for that purpose; under no circumstances should intinction be allowed from the same cup from which communicants are taking a sip of wine. ... For those congregations desiring to offer communion by intinction, arrangements must be made to have a separate station with a chalice or cup expressly for that purpose ... At that station, the minister (an ordained person or a Lay Eucharistic Minister) – not the communicant – must be the only person dipping the host and placing it either in the hand or on the tongue of the communicant." In lieu of a separate station, one may leave the host in the palm of one's hand and the minister will take the host out of the person's hand and intinct it as indicated above.

I hope this explanation for the return to using the common chalice has answered any questions about this sacred and millennia-old practice. The practice of using individual cups has blurred the important symbolism of partaking of one body and one cup. These are the symbols Jesus gave us at the Last Supper. The important symbolic nature of the Holy Eucharist has suffered fracture under our recent practice of using individual cups, and it is refreshing to return to "normal" with the common chalice. With the gift of the Holy Spirit, it seems appropriate to restart this practice on the Day of Pentecost. 

Vestry Meeting Minutes

March 13, 2023

Opening: The St. Peter's Vestry met together in the Diffenbaugh Library on March 13, 2023. Attending the meeting were Fr. Jim, Kimberly Truxell, Debbie Whitehorne, Bruce Comfort, Howard Belote, Judy Eller, Linsey Shreve, Vel Shreve, Peggy Pfeifer, Charlie Pfeifer, and Liz Kress (via Zoom).

<u>Vestry Meeting Opening</u>: The Vestry Meeting was opened with the beginning of the service of Evening Prayer led by Bruce Comfort.

<u>Agenda</u>: Fr. Jim asked all to look at the agenda for the evening and see if any changes or additions needed to be made before starting. Added to new business – ornaments and Sunday School. Charlie motioned to accept the agenda with revisions, and it was seconded by Vel. The agenda was accepted with additions, by acclamation.

<u>February 2023 Minutes</u>: The February 2023 Minutes were distributed to the vestry. Charlie motioned to accept the minutes with modifications, Bruce seconded. The minutes were approved with revisions.

Finance Report: Charlie reviewed the February Financial Report with the vestry.

The Cash Account Balances for February 2023 are as follows:

The February 2023 Financial Report was approved, Kimberly motioned to accept the Finance report and Howard seconded this motion and it was passed by acclamation.

<u>Financial Committee Report</u>: The Vestry acknowledged that we shouldn't increase our insurance for Cyber crime and since it came out of the Finance Committee Meeting, it only needed to be noted in these minutes.

<u>Rector's Report:</u> Fr. Jim reported that he was pleased to finally be able to visit with Mary and Larry Laine and bring them communion. He also was able to go to the hospital to visit Dawn Ramirez (Joey's fiancé).

Senior Warden's Report:

- Lists that were passed around last meeting to sign up for counting had not filled all the necessary slots. Kimberly stepped in to help the previous week, but she would be unable to help on some upcoming Sundays. She asked for a volunteer to help out with Bruce for his first counting duty. Vel volunteered to help, with Charlie also helping.
- Taco Soup will be served by the Vestry for the Wednesday Night in Lent (March 29). A sign-up list was passed around for all to note what they would be willing to bring

Junior Warden:

- Bruce noted that the "Red Door" lock had been changed and 30 keys were obtained. Just about all the keys (9 left) have been distributed.
- Playground mulch is still being worked on.

New Business:

Fr. Jim asked the Vestry to help him with the third part of his Interim training (Field Work). He explained the Interim Ministry/Client Agreement – "Listening to God: Discerning a Life-Giving Vision/Purpose Leading to Mission". Vestry is the "Client". Fr. Jim is the "student". The subject is St. Peter's "Vision" for its future. The

Vestry must be in communication with the Transition Team. The Transition Team consists of: Bruce Comfort (Chair), Dot Pierce, Linsey Shreve, Josie Jimeno, Bob Vanderslice, and Fr. Jim. The Transition Team will stay as a team until the new priest experiences his/her first crisis. They will help them through this "crisis" with their knowledge of the church and congregation. After that "crisis" they will then disband. Members on the Transition Team may also serve on the Search Committee due to the size of our congregation.

The church currently seems to be on the decline side of congregation development. To reverse this trend, the church needs to revision its purpose. The vestry agreed with this assessment, and it will now be the focus of the project.

Fr. Jim would like to commission the Transition Team at a service when all can be there. The contract with the Vestry and Fr. Jim would last while he is here acting as the Interim Rector. His current contract expires in July, 2024.

The Vestry members agreed that they would like to go over the information on Fr. Jim's Interim Ministry Training assignment contract on changing our "Purpose" some more and work on figuring out what it is and what they suggest St. Peter's do.

The Vestry decided that everyone should review the information, write down what they think should be removed or added to the contract (if anything), and email Fr. Jim by March 20th. At that time Fr. Jim will compile all the information sent and make the changes and email the new contract to all for review.

<u>**Ornaments**</u> – What should we do with 55 ornaments for the 50^{th} anniversary (2009)? It was suggested we put the 50^{th} Anniversary Ornaments out for sale at a price of \$5.00. Also available are Franklin Mint decorative plates.

<u>Sunday School</u> – The Sunday School will be shut down during the summer vacation. (June 18th thru September 4th, 2023)

Old Business:

Playground: Bruce stated that St. Peter's would have to put the new timbers in place before mulch is added and he agreed that Matt (Charet Thill's Significant Other) could do the work for St. Peter's. The product would have to be purchased and Matt will pick-up and install when he is available and Bruce sets a firm date.

Annual Audit: Carolyn has finished her audit of our finances for 2021.

Security System on the white Door: Bruce told the Vestry that a new "door-closing device" was needed. Then the door and doorbell can be installed, hopefully within the next two weeks.

Grants for Security of the Church: The price of the grant writer was approximately \$5,000, but the Vestry had basically determined that the church shouldn't go forward in obtaining a Grant until a later date. Some items are being addressed, such as re-keying the red door and the locking system on the white door. It was mentioned that the doors need to be checked after Sunday services to make sure they are secured. Maybe the Vestry members who are counters that week should take this on and do a walk-about before leaving.

Parish Hall Steeple: No work has started yet. Bruce assumes the roofer is waiting until the windows come in before removing what is there now. Bruce will call and see if they have a date that they expect to start the renovation.

Trustees: St. Peter's needs to update the list of Trustees. St. Peter's has three, one of whom is deceased. Howard was asked if he wanted to continue being a Trustee and he declined. Kimberly will find out exactly what is needed to change the Trustees.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned and closed with the Lord's Prayer and the conclusion of the Evening Prayer at 9:00 P.M.
